### Achieving More **Together**

UW-Madison Division of Extension works alongside the people of Wisconsin throughout urban and rural communities to deliver practical educational programs where people live and work. In Door, FoodWIse partners with non-profits, senior meal sites, and county public health to help make the healthy choice the easy choice in our communities.

## Impacts in 2023

Engaged in 102 teaching contacts around exercise and nutrition education topics.

Partnered with groups like Aging & Disability Resource Center of Door County, United Way, JAK's Place, and Door County Public Health.

Worked with two organizations to establish community gardens. Each garden may receive up to \$7,000 in grant funding over 4 years. A new garden at Shepherd of the Bay will supply produce for onsite pantry and children's programming.

Nutrition educator Jace Purdy researched FoodWIse's current and past programming with men with low income and identified a need to expand services for this population. He is now collaborating with partners statewide to identify opportunities to increase access to healthy food and physical activity for male participants.

## Inspiring **Collaborations**



The FoodWIse Team has offered StrongBodies strength training in our region for years. It is an evidence-based exercise program aimed at older people. The FoodWIse model offers the series to low-income people at the same location, with the same group, only twice, and then we must identify a participant willing to become a trained facilitator.

Since FoodWIse serves low-income people, the \$350 cost of facilitator training plus \$25 for CPR training, combined with necessary time off to attend trainings has proven unsustainable.

By partnering with American Heart Association's HeartCorps and using funding accumulated in Door County, it was possible to offset the training fee. In December, FoodWIse identified 3 new facilitators and worked with state StrongBodies team to train them. New sites will be added in 2024.

# Multi-level Program Efforts



FoodWlse offered grant-funded garden initiatives aimed at increasing access to fresh fruits and vegetables for people experiencing limited incomes and providing direct education about healthy eating and growing food. These grants bring in up to \$7,000 of additional SNAP funding per garden. The Growing Together project received national recognition from USDA's National Institute on Food and Agriculture, winning the 2023 Excellence in Extension Team Award.

- Expanded garden efforts at the ADRC of Door County.
- Helped ADRC of Door County grow fresh vegetables to supply a salad bar for senior meals.
- Expanded garden space at JAK's Place provided produce for weekly meals.
- Developed successful multi-level partnerships, offering nutrition and garden education events alongside the gardens.
